Why have a health and safety policy statement?

We can demonstrate our care for others by planning for and addressing issues that might be harmful. Writing a health and safety policy puts your commitment on paper and shows everyone their health and safety is taken seriously.

- It demonstrates your commitment to health and safety
- It details your goals and objectives
- It helps identify responsibilities for leaders, staff, visitors and any contractors

How to write a health and safety policy statement

Documenting a health and safety policy statement does not need to be complicated or time-consuming. To help, we have created a template you can download [here](#) and complete. Talk to your staff, contractors and volunteers about your health and safety commitments and document them in the template provided. Once you've developed your policy statement display it in a prominent location.

Tell everyone about it so they know what they should expect and what is expected of them. Remember to review your policy statement regularly (say, once a year) to ensure it remains relevant and effective.
